In light of this, we have committed to diversifying our Board and partnerships to reflect the world we live in. We will also focus on forging more opportunities to work and partner closely with our local companies in Kenya and set an example of providing solutions to the numerous water infrastructure needs in the country.

Water Accessibility



173,844 gallons (**658,000** liters) per day production capacity of clean and safe water pumped from **6** boreholes sites

KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Last year, your generous gifts and support helped to further our mission and long-lasting and life-changing impact on our children, and their schools and communities. Here are a few of the highlights.



Expanding Our Services

With the support of the local community, we expanded our model of community water supply to Kajiado County. The Indoinyo Water Project consisted of drilling a 500ft (153M) borehole, equipping it with a solar powered submersible pump, elevated water tower, and piping to the community school, church, and community access point and livestock point. The new permanent water source serves more than 3,000 residents, including students at the Indoinyo Primary School. Previously, residents would access their water from unclean sources often sharing it with their livestock which would increase the risk of spreading waterborne diseases. They also would be forced to relocate during drought to search for water sources. It is having a positive impact on school attendance, and is creating a stronger, more economically viable and healthier community.



Empowering Sustainable Communities with Technology

Earlier this year, in coordination with the Uhola Village Foundation, we completed the new state-of-the-art Uhola Water Project. Located in Western Kenya, this water source includes a solar powered submersible pump to extract 4,800 gallons (18,000 liters) clean and safe water daily out of the ground for 3,000 residents in the village and Uhola Primary School. Harnessing the power of the sun and distributing to the community via our cashless ATM, this new system also pipes water to the schools new permanent hand washing stations, flush toilets and the school farm. The trained water management committee ensures 24-hour access, full transparency and sustainable operation of this water resource for years to come.



Improving Lives for the Most Vulnerable

Last year, we provided support to two orphanages, Miti Mingi Village and Hope for Life. At Miti Mingi Village, we addressed a waste management issue, treating 14,800 Gallons (56,000L) of black water from 15 households at the orphanage daily. The project consisted of black water treatment, in-line chlorination, sand filtration and carbon filtration with a holding reservoir of 1.5 million liters that is connected to farm irrigation. At Hope for Life, our expert services converted the orphanage's current water pump system to solar power. This allows the facility to generate 30 kilowatts of energy per day, giving them the ability to pump 8,500 Gallons (32,000L) of water daily for their needs as well as supplying the surrounding community.

YOUR IMPACT

Transforming Schools with Water

Deputy Head Samuel at Piave Primary School is elated with the positive change he has seen unfold at the school. He states, "In previous school years I used to write many referral letters to the local health clinic for pupils with waterborne diseases. Since Ekenywa has been supplying water and handwashing stations, we have not had to write a single referral." Access to clean water has also given the school the means to manage their own school farm for the students. This is a great resource for STEM activities and hands-on agriculture training for the school, in addition to the benefit of providing a nutritious food source for the student body.



Planting Seeds, Harvesting Change

350 indigenous trees were planted on the campus' of Piave and Kaiyaba Primary Schools providing beauty, shade and life to the schools. The trees were hand selected by Kenya Tree Forest and are naturally occurring in Kenya. These indigenous trees are better for the environment and will last for hundreds of years to come. This was a great experience for the students of the schools who got to learn the importance of planting trees and will serve as a great learning space for children in all future classes.

In support of the project, we were honored to have the volunteer services of Mary Kiige, a Rotaractor with Rotary International. Through the Rotary Club of Nakuru's Adopt a River Initiative, Mary connected with Ekenywa on our tree planting project. With a lifelong passion toward the outdoors, she focuses on projects that create awareness and the importance of a healthy environment. Mary says, "the tree planting project has made a great impact on the Nakuru community. I hope Ekenywa continues doing more of the great work that they do."



RESPONSE TO THE CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC

During the unprecedented pandemic with Covid-19, our Ekenywa team (as a WASH organization) has been at the forefront of both National and Local committees in Kenya that bring together partners from public, private and nonprofit sectors. The response has been influenced by a robust analysis of the key issues with a view of finding immediate and long term solutions to flatten the curve.

AREAS OF FOCUS

Throughout the pandemic, we have focused on the areas of prevention, sustenance, and sustainability to support our local communities:

Prevention: Buying, distributing and installing handwashing stations for use in high density areas.

Sustenance: Provision of food and other essential supplies to low income earners whose livelihoods have been affected.

Sustainability: A continuous supply of soap, water and sanitizers to the newly established hand washing station.

IMPACT

We have made a tremendous impact on our local Nakuru County communities with the distribution and installation of handwashing stations and the provision of clean water, disinfectants and food.

Handwashing Stations

95 stations (**1.5 million** hand washes)
26,000 gallons (**100,000** liters) of water delivered



Disinfectants

350 gallons (**1,300** liters) of sanitizers
260 gallons (**1,000** liters) of soap



Food Hampers

1,000 hampers
6,000 beneficiaries






